

Results of the Orphan Works Survey 2009/2010

Purpose of the Survey

To give input to the EUCOM's /DG MARKT impact assessment on orphan works

To update the results of the 2005 survey "The rights issue"

To demonstrate that the orphan works problem concerns Europe's film archives as well

To stress the need for EU-wide and crosssector-solutions to facilitate the use of orphan works



Key Findings

Total number of films held in 24 archives = ca. 1.064.000

Rights neither researched nor known: 31% or ca. 325.000 films

Rights researched but not found = Orphan works 12 % or ca. 129.000 films

(Presumed) Orphan works: 21% or ca. 225.000 films



Requests for orphan works per year


Total n°= 4416 (17 archives responded)

For cultural purposes: 55 % (= 2436)

For commercial purposes: 44% (= 1950)





Classification of (presumed) orphan works (ca. 225.000 films)



Classification of (presumed) orphan works (ca. 225.000 films)


2. Country of Production

Conclusions

The scale and impact of orphan works is huge:

Orphan films are blocked for all kind of uses and prevent archives to fullfil their public mission.

Orphan films contribute to create the "20th century blackhole"

No legal certainty: A low risk approach does not prevent archives from prosecution

Without ressources to clear rights, the situation in European film archives will aggravate.
